Learning Focus

This year's production was a re-telling of the magical story of Dorothy and her adventures in The Land of Oz.



Science Family Night featuring the Athena Mission

On Thursday, 17 August, in conjunction with Science Week, five students went on a simulated mission to Mars. The students had been undertaking weekly training since Term 1 to prepare themselves for the mission. The astronauts were taken by 'spaceship' to Mars. They then set up their base in one of the science classrooms. During their 27 hour mission, the astronauts had to rehydrate space food, undertake experiments on plants, collect and analyse soil samples, set-up solar panels to provide energy to the station, complete health checks and communicate with mission control via Skype. The students adapted to being in such confined positions extremely well and learned a lot about themselves. I am not sure that any would be rushing to put their hands up for the 'real' Mars mission.

On the same evening the College held its very first Family Science Night. Visitors were able to undertake experiments in Chemistry, Physics, Biology and Psychology. They learned how fireworks get their colours, created a pH rainbow, made neurons, saw nature up close, interacted with Newton and gravity, drove robots and made bristlebots. A highlight for many were the fire bubbles created from soapy water and gas.
